One weekend at the end of October every year, the Swedish IFYE Club hold its annual meeting. We IFYEs meet, have fun and discover a new part of Sweden. So even this year, but this year, it was a little extra. This year we also celebrated our 60-year anniversary. We have found a note dated in December 1952. A group of IFYE's had met and had fun. They also decided that they shall continue to meet and the Swedish IFYE club was founded. Absolutely fantastic, sixty years back!



This year we were about 50 IFYE's gathered in Gislaved in Småland. Our IFYE's (Alf, Ruth, Birgitta, Lasse, Lennart and Helena) who live in Småland had planned a super program for us.

Friday evening we looked at pictures from last summer's big event when we hosted all of you, at the Conference in Kungälv. But we also viewed pictures from our 60-years of IFYE, Ingall and some of us had brought Conference reports, photo albums, newspaper articles, yes "you name it" from all our common IFYE meetings both in Sweden and abroad, from our IFYE stays and as host families. An incredibly fun and exciting reading. Many happy memories appeared in our minds and we told stories and laughed. "Is that you?", "But do you remember?", "Have you heard anything?", "Do you have contact with?", "Were you there?" etc. A great thank you to you Ingall who gathered all these memories.

The Saturday started with our annual meeting. An annual meeting as many others. Ann-Margreth Karlsson was elected the chair person for one more year and the main issue on the agenda was, as it certainly is for most of you; How do we get our 4H members to apply for the IFYE programme? How do we get them to come to our meetings/conferences?

Gislaved is known for its tires. (Gislaved is situated not very close from the Swedish "Monza race track", Anderstorp.) The production closed down some years ago, unfortunately but for us Swedes, the tires will always be there. We made a visit to the Industrial Museum and were told that to us more known articles were produced in Gislaved than tires, such as galoshes (overshoes) for both ladies and men, dolls, packages, glass, leather etc. After the visit to the Industrial Museum Alf took us to southern Sweden's largest and most visited ski resort; Isaberg. A winter weekend, thousands of Swedes and Danes visit the resort. Up on top, with a lovely view, we went and pretended that there was snow and we were whizzing down the slopes.



Our 60-years celebration festivities started in the evening with a glass of wine and then we had a very delicious dinner. Birgitta Sigfridsson, the hostess for the evening made us feel very special. She read poems and stories by authors from the neighbourhood in a Småland dialect (we who were not from the area did pretend we understood and clapped our hands and laughed as everyone else afterwards). We sang and there was also musical entertainment. Sven-Olof Birgersson made a speech to honour the IFYE club, We had a very pleasant time.

The Sunday we visited Alf and Ruth where Alf told us about his life story and amazing enterprises. It all started with a 4H project targeting of Swedish forest plants on a small scale to the existing teak plantations of 600ha in Panama. On the way the entrepreneurship has consisted of many carpets from rag-rugs to oriental rugs. Then we were treated a typical cheesecake from Småland with cherry jam and cream. The weekend ended with lunch at the High Chaparral, the wild, Wild West facility in Småland.

Many warm thanks to the organisers for a weekend of entrepreneurship, tires and many fantastic IFYE memories.

Aventure in Zambia



UK Member Joan Green – busy retirement life helping others.

"My exchange visit was to Israel in 1970 where 2 of us worked on 2 Kibbutz and stayed with 3 families in different parts of Israel. I have since returned to Israel in 1982 at Christmas, which was a remarkable experience. I also was leader of a YFC Group to Finland in 1972.

I have been retired from teaching since July 2003. My first day of retirement was at the World Conference in Sweden. I was always busy, but only began with this Charity in 2007, when I heard a talk about its work and realised there was one of their Warehouses just down the road from where I lived."

Retirement;

Who said retirement was relaxation, a good book, cup of tea, perhaps a bit of gardening and Ladies who Lunch!!!! Forget it!!! I have never been busier, with Womens Institute, Ladies Probus, Countrywomen and Volunteer with the National Trust. This is not all, most of my time is spent as a volunteer for the National Police Aid Convoys. This Charity was set up almost 20 years ago to get aid to countries where there was a need, initionally in Eastern Europe.

We collect, sort, clean and pack a large number of items given to us to be sent either by lorry to Europe or by sea on a container further afield.

Our main aims are to support schools and hospital projects. Clothes, household items etc help to fill spaces. We don't buy anything, all has been given, school tables, chairs, books, stationery etc, hospital beds, cabinets, dressings, equipment etc. Lots of Ladies groups knit blankets and clothes too.



As a volunteer I have been to Albania 6 times, flying out to meet lorries, helping to unpack them and then distributing the goods. We also collect 'Wish Lists' of what else is needed. We all pay our own expenses and sometimes we are loaned lorries. My latest love is Zambia. A group of us first went out in 2010, visiting schools, hospitals and clinics we have been supporting for several years, to see how the things are being used and to collect more 'Wish Lists'. The need here is great, basic items pens, pencils, reading and exercise books, as well as tables and chairs, so the children do not have to sit

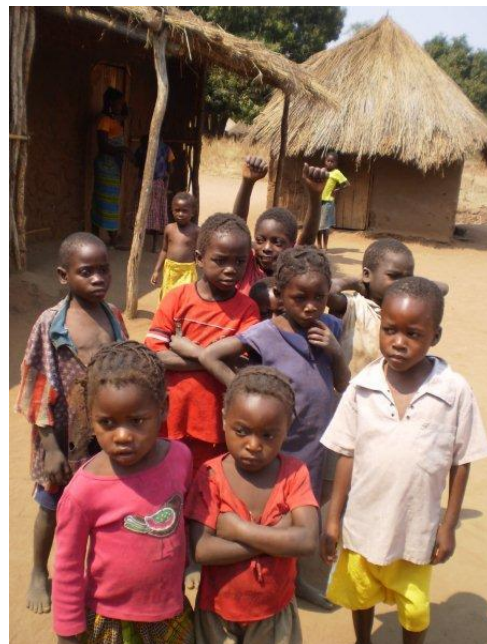
on the concrete floor for their lessons. In the hospitals patients were sharing beds, providing their own bedding, if they had any, families feeding them and equipment in short supply.

In August 2012, 3 weeks after IFYE Sweden, 12 of us returned, revisiting the projects we have been supporting. There were many tears when we could see the difference our contributions had made. We unloaded a container whilst we were there and managed to give out lots of items. One school received an organ and the following day we visited this school, on a Sunday morning and again more tears as we heard the organ being played beautifully by one of the pupils. We are helping this school become an area Music Centre and we saw how all the instruments we have sent were being used.

We travel hundreds of miles over bumpy roads in to the bush so we also see lots of the wild animals, giraffe are my favourite.

Our Charity supports other charities by helping to fill their containers from our huge stock. We have helped Rwanda, Ghana, Zanzibar, Pakistan, Sierra Leone, Gambia and more are on the horizon, like Senegal, Kenya, Tanzania, Nicaragua, South Africa.

What makes me do all this??? Just to see or imagine all the smiles our efforts bring.
