

Starting the Journey - Europe

Our journey began in August 2023. Before meeting up with Nicole, I travelled through Switzerland by train, where I was hosted by Franzi Hengartner in Zurich, and Lukas Helfenstein took me sailing on Lake Geneva. I then stayed with Simone Hutter in Zell am See before meeting up with Kelly Renals and Nicole in Salzburg. We travelled together to Graz, and then on to the World IFYE Conference in Velden, where we reunited with old friends and made many new ones.



Exploring Canada

After the conference, Nicole and I travelled to Slovenia, Venice, and Lisbon before flying to Canada. We explored Montreal and Quebec City as tourists. Our IFYE connections in Canada came through Steedsy (a Scottish IFYE), who did his exchange there. He connected us with his friend Carolyn Doris in Peterborough, near Toronto. Carolyn then introduced us to her friend Anne Bromley, who lives in a very rural area north of Ottawa.

We had never met Anne before, yet she offered us her sister-in-law's condo in Ottawa *before* we even reached her farm! The hospitality was incredible—both Carolyn and Anne cooked for us, showed us around, and made us feel so welcome. Anne even invited us to her grandson's christening party and let us stay at their lake house! Whilst at Carolyn's another IFYE, Julie Milne took us to a demolition derby at a local show ground too. We also did day trips to Toronto, Niagara Falls, Toronto zoo and went horseback riding.





USA East Coast – Grapes, Crabs, and Choirs

After city stops in Boston, New York, and Washington D.C., we stayed with IFYE host Jennifer Schmitt in Maryland. Jennifer, who did her exchange in Africa, responded to our post on the USA IFYE Facebook group. We were once again welcomed into a stranger's home with open arms!

While staying with Jennifer, we harvested grapes in their vineyard, rode the maize harvester, and enjoyed authentic Maryland crab. I even tried something called pretzel salad—it was like a trifle!

Next stop was just outside Chicago, we visited Carolyn Brummel, her husband Scott, and her mum Beth. We helped out at Carolyn's pumpkin wagon farm shop, attended a choir concert with the family, and enjoyed cocktails afterward.



Montana Adventures - Shooting, Sightseeing, and National Parks

We then endured a 26-hour train journey to Montana to stay with our friend Anna Parker. Though we only crossed paths with Anna for one day before she flew to Northern Ireland, her parents kept us company. Anna's dad gave us a shooting lesson, and her mum let us help harvest vegetables from the greenhouse. Another IFYE, Matti Osterman, took us sightseeing in Great Falls and to an ice hockey game. We also visited the breathtaking Glacier and Yellowstone National Parks, where we saw a bear, a wolf, elk, and buffalo.
