I hope you enjoy the articles in this Newsletter and you are hereby challenged to contribute with small and big IFYE related stories in the upcoming editions.



Executive Committee Report 2013

(To be read out at Country Meetings prior to the Annual General Meeting)

The 54th European IFYE Alumni Conference was held at Kungälv, Sweden from 21st – 28th July, 2012. It was a wonderful, eventful and relaxing week, full of new experiences, good food and entertainment, held in a truly historic location in the countryside alongside a castle. Our grateful thanks and appreciation are extended to our Swedish hosts who provided a wide-ranging programme in such a peaceful location.

The Executive Committee has again worked well as a team and met for the mid-term meeting in January in Abergavenny, Wales in the beautiful home of Alison and Keith Spencer. Mary Roberts joined us and we had a lengthy agenda, many discussions and decisions made, and amongst many items, the following should be of interest:

- Country Reports for 2012 are available on www.ifye.org
- IFYE Conference Promotion of Attendance – A six minute 'teaser' has been produced. (A link for this has been sent to the Contact Members to forward to their country members by email, and to all exchangees from the last three years, to tempt them to attend).
- A Letter of Introduction to European IFYE's in 2012, 2011 and 2010, was sent out by the 1st Vice President via e-mail, with links to the Welsh IFYE Conference website, and the new promotional conference 'teaser'.
- Lukas Helfenstein, (CH) kindly represented and promoted EIFYEA at the European Rally, held in Poland in 2012 and provided us with a comprehensive report. Closer links have been established with Rural Youth Europe in recent years, and it is hoped to build on these in future, by more effective promotion of EIFYEA during the European Rally each year.
- EIFYEA Administration – 'Executive Committee Guidelines', a comprehensive booklet, has been prepared by members of the Executive Committee. It sets out useful guidelines for the smooth running, and efficient operation of the EIFYEA organisation and will be of immense benefit to existing and new members of the Executive Committee in the future.
- A report has been provided to the IFYE continent groups around the World, outlining EIFYEA's purpose, structure and organisation.
- Newsletter – This has been produced four times during the last year and emailed to recipients.
- IFYE Website – A new host for the site was implemented from September 2012, and has proved to be more efficient than the previous host.
- Finances – The Executive Committee has reviewed all finances and is satisfied that no increase in the Membership fee is required, and that it should remain at 20CHF for an Annual Membership and 240CHF for a Lifetime Membership
- Membership statistics – There are currently 277 Lifetime Members and 35 Annual Members.
- 60th Anniversary of IFYE European Conferences in 2018 – The sub- committee has provided a report to the Executive Committee which was discussed at the mid term meeting and will give an update of its work, ahead of the 2013 AGM. The Executive Committee will consider the report and make recommendations for consideration by the Contact Members/Country Members at the AGM.
- Hosting of Future IFYE Conferences – Arrangements are in place to host the European Conference in 2013 (Wales), 2014 (Germany) and Scotland (2015), and one Country has expressed an interest in hosting in 2017, the Executive Committee has written to all Contact Members to request that their country's discuss hosting the Conference in 2016, before the 2013 AGM.

As retiring President, (due to conclude my 3rd two-year term), this is my 6th and final Executive Committee Report. Since being appointed as President in Norway in 2007, I have been privileged to attend fantastic conferences, held in Switzerland 2008; Isle of Man 2009; Austria 2010; Finland 2011; Sweden 2012 and now this year in Wales.

It has been a great honour, privilege and pleasure to have served as your President, and I express my thanks and sincere appreciation to you all for your support, and my particular thanks to all members of the Executive Committee for their hard work, commitment and enthusiasm.

I am sure Members will have noticed that much has been achieved in recent years, with great improvements in the smooth running of EIFYEA and in making the organisation 'fit for the future'!

I look forward to seeing you all in Wales for what is sure to be a super Conference, with the input from Alison Spencer, Mary Roberts and the rest of the Welsh team.

Statistics – Countries and Exchanges

Over the last years we have tried to systematically collect information on the number of exchanges and which countries the exchange is between the actual years.

From the information we can see that on some fields the countries are very much alike but there are also some major differences. To attend/apply for the IFYE programme it is in some countries enough that you are interested in agriculture and culture and want to travel, in most countries you have to be a member of your local organisation and in one country (Norway) you have to have completed your 4H programme which means doing 7 projects in 7 years and achieved "plaketten" to be able to apply, it's meant to be a treat to the members.

We see that some national IFYE clubs don't have a membership's fee, but most have. One country says that they have lifetime members. The size of the national alumni clubs varies from 33 to 556 members.

The exchanges offered in the different countries are between one week and 6 months and the country sending out most IFYE exchanges this year is Switzerland.



How blessed we both were to be chosen by The Young Farmer's Clubs of Ulster to represent our country in the USA with some 150 other IFYE's from all over the world.

When John went to the states food rationing had only recently been lifted here in Northern Ireland and he was in awe of the huge steaks at a 'pot luck' supper in his host families church and he was absolutely shocked when the remaining T-bone steaks were hurled to the dogs, when all the people had had enough.

I was amazed to be offered 'punch' in Utah where no alcohol was served at a wedding. 'No thank you!' I said. But then I realised 'punch' was a fruit juice cocktail not whiskey and water as I expected, which was the way in Ireland!

John and I met on a Y.F.C. three week study trip to 'study' agriculture in Denmark, but John later went off to Australia for three years to explore New South Wales,

while I finished my studies. During these years of separation we corresponded by letter. In fact I didn't hear John voice for three years, how different to now when we can phone or skype!!

Being an exchangee is a life changing experience but hosting exchangees is very fulfilling as well. All during our lives we have had the pleasure of hosting. In the 50's we had Kay Homan, the then president of the Junior Farmer's of Ontario, who was with us again here last year. David Wilson was an exchangee from New Zealand, who fell head over heels in love with Tamara from Indiana. She was 19 years of age and David a mature 29 year old. I tried to talk sense to them but to no avail. The following year they were married in Indiana and John and I, with our daughter and a friend went to their wedding. They are now happily married with three gorgeous daughters. Ursula from Switzerland and Regula all made lasting friendships. Mary Ball come frequently from Virginia and actually first met us the evening John and I became engaged at the Opera House in Belfast.

Just last year our daughter Raequelle took her three teenagers to Schleswig-Holstein to stay with our son, Jonathan's, host family. Jonathan was an exchangee to Germany 25 years ago. He had the delight of planting cabbages every day and dancing every evening. His host sister Gersa came to us for six months to study medicine at Altnagelvin Hospital, so that she could improve her English, before specialising in surgery. All lovely people and each bring their special charm.



John and I had marvellous times at the World Conferences we attended. I will never forget standing and swaying on the tram in Adelaide and a man saying loudly 'That sounds like John Cromie'; the two men hadn't seen each other since being in the states in 1954. One day I looked out my kitchen window and gasped 'If that doesn't look like Marcus from Kangaroo Island' and it was!!

Thank you to all the European Conferences each better than the last that we attended – madly dressed up with face paint all over our bodies or as a 'hexan' in the Hartz mountains, or enjoying brilliant food at Toppen in Norway with Hilde. Thank you Hilde for having our daughter, son-in-law and our three grandchildren to stay a week in your home. What gorgeous lilies Hilde had in her garden.

John and I enjoy all our friends who come and stay or visit. You enrich our lives so much, but the icing on the cake is the fact that just last week Andrew our 16 year old Grandson was chosen for a short term exchange to Finland. It would be extra special if he was able to see Eva, who lives in Helsinki and was with me at Mid-point meeting in USA in 1960.
